Elaine's femininity nurtured my masculine soul, and she received the reciprocal from me. I miss *that* so much too, but there's something more. What WAS it, that came into a room, any room, with Elaine? There was a "presence," but what was it? Or better, "WHO was it?"

THE TWO SHALL BECOME ONE
